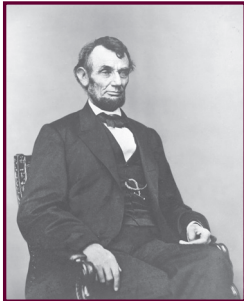

Dr. Paul Schmelzer will examine how President Lincoln's role as commander-in-chief proved essential to the nation's very survival. Lincoln exercised the right to take any necessary measures to preserve the union and majority rule, including violating long-standing civil liberties.

PCCLD librarian Rebecca Atkinson will share her research on the effects of President Lincoln's monumental Homestead Act on the settlement of frontier Colorado. Though designed



for political reasons, especially as a means of keeping slavery out of Western states, the opportunities the act offered for women, minorities, and immigrants provided rights these people had never had before.
