Brief Program History

The **Pan-African Studies Community Education Program (PASCEP)** is a unique and multi-faceted program founded in 1975 by Annie D. Hyman, a Temple University graduate and North Philadelphia community activist who sought to bring the University to the community. Prior to coming to Temple, the Community Education Program was held in neighborhood schools, churches and centers. University faculty, most of whom were from the Pan-African Studies Department of the College of Arts and Sciences of Temple University, volunteered time to teach classes. Ms. Hyman later obtained the support of Dr. Odeyo Ayaga, who was then the Pan-African Studies Department Chairman, to seek Temple University's sponsorship of the program.

In the Spring of 1979, the University incorporated the Program and PASCEP became the community outreach component of the Temple University Pan-African Studies Department, subsequently re-named the African American Studies Department. Faculty of Pan-African Studies and other departments continued to volunteer time to teach courses for PASCEP: Dr. Rita Smith, Dr. Tran Van Dinh, Professor Sonia Sanchez, Professor Jacqueline Mungai, Dr. Barbara Hampton, of Pan-African Studies, and Dr. Audrey Pittman and Dr. Thaddeus Mathis, of the School of Social Administration, and Dr. Wilbert Roget, of the Department of French and Italian, among others, including Afro-musicologist, Harrison Ridley, Jr. of WRTI-FM. Pan-African Studies Department undergraduate students also served as tutors and literacy instructors.

In the past 30 years PASCEP has offered over 375 listed courses, 150 lectures and seminars, and has given a voice to many volunteer faculty members who come from myriad professions and all walks of life. Today, all of PASCEP's courses continue to be taught by volunteer professionals from the community whose purpose is to give back to others what they have received in knowledge, skill, inspiration and example. Since 1988, numerous undergraduate and graduate students from African American Studies, English, French, Sociology, Anthropology, Education, Social Administration and other departments have joined the volunteer faculty of PASCEP. **Community self-help is no better exemplified than in the PASCEP philosophy and practice!**

GED Mathematics #01

Prepare for the General Educational Development (GED) examination. This course is also useful for anyone wishing to improve math skills. Computation, fractions, decimals, percent, geometry and algebra are taught.

INSTRUCTORS:

Ed Coleman, MA., is a graduate of Cornell University, where he earned an M.A. He has been a volunteer at PASCEP since 1998 and is currently serving as the Lead GED Math Instructor. He is also a member of the PASCEP Advisory Council (PAC) and the Association for the Study of Classical African Civilizations (ASCAC).

Janie McCaslin has been a member of the PASCEP faculty since 2002. She is a past member of the 39th District Advisory Board, and held the title of Committee Person for twelve years. She has volunteered for the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole, was a Coordinator for the Young at Heart Senior Ministry, tutored children from kindergarten to third grade, and also teaches Basic Adult Literacy Skills for PASCEP. She has earned certificates as a community leader, tutor and teacher, and has received a diploma for Bible Theology Studies for Practical Bible and Ministry.

Marie Harris is currently retired. She is a member of the Young At Heart Senior Ministry and has been a member of the PASCEP faculty since 2003.

Linda Edwards is a veteran teacher, retired from the school district of Abington, where she taught mathematics for 33 years. She is a graduate of Penn State University.

Criseeda Seals is a graduate of the Community College of Philadelphia and Eastern University. She taught in the School District of Philadelphia as a substitute teacher, and serves as a tutor for the Center for Literacy (CFL).

Larry Singleton, Ph.D., taught educational research and test measurements at the University of Massachusetts for 27 years. As a public school teacher, he taught high school and middle school mathematics. He is the author of several publications, including the annual Outstanding Black College Students.

CEP #04-B • African American Relationships Today!

(8 Weeks)

People of African descent are living a different reality compared to many in today's world. Naturally, this will direct our focus in our pursuit of a loving life partner. First we will explore our personal truth and our current reality. Second we will look at the problems inherent in any relationship. Third we will discuss and review the promises we have made to ourselves based on our expectations regarding relationships. Finally to insure balance and harmony in our romantic relationships we must know how to maintain them. Too often our innate passion for what we think or suppose others have in relationships can lead us astray.

Instructor: Ann P. Jeter has an MSW from the University of Pennsylvania and has been a PASCEP instructor for approximately 12 years. She is the author of *More Than Surviving Your Education: a Handbook for the African American Student*. She currently leads seminars on a variety of subjects including relationships, education, parenting, and African history.

CEP #213-A • Basic Design/Sewing • (8 Weeks)

NOT FOR BEGINNERS

This is a course in basic flat pattern drafting and sewing. Students will have fun creating their own fashion statement, whether in a garment, tote bag, kufi or other item. Creative uses of African and Afrocentric fabrics will be emphasized. Tips on entrepreneurship will be included.

Requirements: Basic sewing skills. Bring a portable sewing machine to the second class meeting.

Instructor: Suzi White is a professional freelance fashion designer. She is a fashion consultant, wedding and fashion show coordinator. She studied fashion at the Philadelphia College of Art and Moore College of Art and Design.

CEP #294 • Discovering Your Faith • (12 Weeks)

This course will examine why prayer is vital to our faith. Learn what the Bible teaches about prayer and how to improve your current prayer life. Discussion will center on attitudes in prayer, scope of prayer and hindrances to prayer.

2.4 Continuing Education Units (CEU)

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Willie Rogers, Curriculum Specialist for PASCEP. He brings more than 30 years of diverse experience as an elementary school teacher, counselor, career development trainer, psychotherapist, and former director of a social service agency.

CEP #138-A • Etymology • (12 Weeks)

In this course, students will be taught phrases (participles, gerunds and infinitives) as well as clauses (noun clauses, adjective clauses and adverb clauses). Students will be introduced to the concept of semantics and grammar. The objective of this course is to provide students with the skills to speak, read and write more effectively.

Prerequisite: *Introduction to Etymology*

Fee: \$20 **Act-48 Credits Add \$25 to Fee** **Student Limit:** 25

Instructor: Abdullah El Talib Mosi Bey studied under the tutelage of the late Professor John Burton and Richard Bailey for three years. Since studying etymology, he has developed a Language and Study Skills Program for the Moors Order of the Roundtable, where he has taught basic reading and writing to children and adults. He is Editor-in-Chief of the Al Moroccan Star newspaper and the Moorish Civil letter newspaper. He earned a BA in Sociology from Glassboro State College and an MSW from Rutgers University Graduate School of Social Work.

CEP #372 • Food, Diet & Health in the Community • (10 Weeks)

An interactive class with guest speakers, films and panel discussions about issues and concerns facing our community. Topics will include food sources, food processing, community gardens, greening projects and health problems. This is a proactive class seeking answers to age old dietary and health problems in the community.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Zakiyyah Ali is a lecturer and researcher in the field of nutrition. Currently, she is the President of the Black Vegetarians Society of the Tri-State area.

CEP #21-A • History of African American Music • (12 Weeks)

This course provides an extensive survey of African and African American musical forms, including folk music of the Caribbean and South America, work songs, gospel, spirituals, blues, jazz and folk and popular music of the U.S., all studied in the context of its economic, political and geographical background. The course will profile leading jazz musicians such as "Duke" Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, Miles Davis and other instrumentalists and vocalists. Use of lectures, audiotapes and films, and handout literature will convey the vast canvas of this great art treasure.

Fee: \$20 **Act-48 Credits Add \$25 to Fee** **Student Limit:** 25

Instructor: Harrison Ridley, Jr., is one of the most sought-after Afro-musicologists on the East Coast. He is a volunteer at WRTI-FM radio at Temple University, where he has hosted for more than 20 years the popular Sunday night show "The Historical Approach to the Positive Music." The owner of one of the largest recorded music and music book collections in the area, he has taught at PASCEP for 29 years and for Temple University's Non-Credit Program. He also lectures, serves as MC at major jazz shows and has been featured on several television programs. He is a jazz consultant to the Library of Congress and is Archivist for the Philadelphia Clef Club.

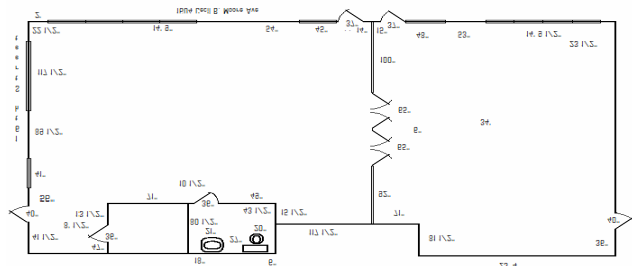
CEP #134 • Housing Rehabilitation • (12 Weeks) (6:00-9:00PM)

This course provides an overview of the building trade industry. Each student will receive useful and beneficial information whether home owners, perspective buyers, or how-to-do-it people. This course is not intended to be complex or difficult, but students are expected to participate in class and in onsite practical building projects unless physical limitations exist. We will cover the following major areas of housing: carpentry, electrical systems/ circuits, and plumbing. The course is not limited to the areas mentioned above. We will focus on any interests that the students have, depending on time availability.

Fee: \$50 **NO WAIVERS** **Student Limit: 25**

Instructional Materials: \$30

Instructor: Bradley T.K.E. Harley is a general contractor.

**CEP #259 • Hypnotherapy: The Power of the Subconscious Mind • (12 Weeks)**

The purpose and aim of this course is to teach students the power of positive thinking and the impact that it has on the subconscious mind. The student will learn how the subconscious mind operates and when and how to use it to enhance personal life experiences. This knowledge will aid in the achievement of higher goals, eliminate unwanted behaviors and participate in wellness behaviors.

Fee: \$20 **Student Limit: 25**

Textbook: *The Power of the Subconscious Mind* by Dr. Joseph Murphy

Instructor: J. Joanne Yohannes, holds a BA in Sociology from St. Joseph's University, and her Master's studies include counseling psychology, training and development, and creative experience in Education. She is a Registered and Certified Hypnotherapist, and has been with bfc networks, pc for 10 years. Her work at this group psychotherapy practice in Ardmore, PA., emphasizes the development of human potential through relaxation and guided imagery. Ms. Yohannes conducts individual sessions and group seminars addressing stress management, workplace productivity, personal relationships and athletic performance.

CEP #334 • Intermediate Kiswahili • (10 Weeks)

Prerequisite: Knowledge of spoken and written Kiswahili

This is an intermediate level Swahili language and culture class. Participants interested in enrolling must have completed the beginner level class at PASCEP or have some level of understanding of the Swahili language. The class focuses on developing listening and speaking abilities while incorporating cultural studies into the syllabus.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Naima Black lived on the island of Amu in Kenya for 21 years. She is fluent in the Kiamu dialect, the oldest living dialect of Swahili. Ms. Black has taught Swahili in various capacities for many years. She is a member of the African Language Teachers Association, a translator, and has worked on such assignments as the U.S. v. Bin Laden trial in New York.

CEP #123-B • Introduction to Databases Using Microsoft Access • (10 Weeks) (7:00-8:45PM)

This course focuses on the fundamental concepts of a RDBMS (Relational Database Management System) using Microsoft Access. Learn RDBMS functions: tables; forms; queries; reports; macros; SQL; how to design, create, use, and modify each of the five components; and what SQL (Structured Query Language) is and how to use it. Through lecture, discussion, laboratory practice and readings, you will obtain an understanding of the major tools, skills and techniques needed to successfully create and maintain application systems using the Microsoft Access RDBMS.

Prerequisites: You must be able to navigate freely in a Windows environment and at a comfort level using the mouse, keyboard, etc. Homework will require outside computer usage (Home or Temple laboratory).

2.4 Continuing Education Units (CEU)

CEP #304-A • Introduction to Excel • (8 Weeks)

This course introduces you to spreadsheets and how to manipulate them. You will create, edit, save, and format a worksheet; insert, format, and delete rows and columns as well as find and replace data, move, copy and paste cells, rows, and columns; and insert and edit formulas in a worksheet.

Fee: \$20 *Act-48 Credits Add \$25 to Fee* **Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: Cheryl Devose holds an MBA in information systems and a BS in finance. She graduated from Drexel University and St. Joseph's University, respectively.



MONDAY 7 – 9 PM

CEP #199 • Introduction to Wing Chun Kung Fu •
(12 Weeks)

This course will take a holistic look at Kung Fu and will encompass practical aspects of self-defense to develop the whole person through martial arts training. The practice of Wing Chun is known to increase balance, coordination, timing, sensitivity and relaxation.

Fee: \$20
Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Dewey Thomas is affiliated with the Wyatt School of Wing Chun Kung Fu.

CEP #320 • Knowing Your Personal Income Tax • (6 Weeks)

This course brings the individual up close and personal with his/her income tax. Over 70% Of Americans pay a tax specialist to prepare their annual returns. Over 90 % of these individuals do not understand their tax form/s. *All you need to know about your taxes! Do you need to file a return? How, when, where and, why should you file a return.* Understand how the IRS tax codes relate to you, how to meet those requirements without the headache, understanding what you are signing when you endorse your return and how to read the return. Reduce your fear of Uncle Sam. Participants will be involved in preparing simple returns. Even if you still need a tax specialist, now you will understand what he/she is entering on your return.

Student Limit: 25

He is currently employed as a specialist in educational testing with the Temple University Measurement and Research Center(TUMRC).

CEP #360 • The History of the Bahai Faith• (12 Weeks)

This is a basic overview of the history of Bahai faith, its principal beliefs and an historical view of God's relationship with mankind, and its development into a global religion. The development of Bahai institutions in relationship to God and man's expectations in this day and age will be historically overviewed.

Fee: \$20
Student Limit: 15

Instructor: Paul Schantz graduated with a B.A. in history from Bluffton College, in Bluffton, Ohio. He attended one year of graduate school at Temple University, and taught one year at Strawberry Mansion Junior High School for the Philadelphia School District. He also worked for three years as a social worker for the City of Philadelphia and sold insurance for 16 years. He has been a GED reading instructor for PASCEP for four years and currently serves as the Lead GED Reading and Social Studies Instructor.

CEP #195 • The Journey from Africa to America: Teaching Children Their African American Culture & History •
(6 Weeks)

This Afrocentric course will benefit adults (teachers, parents, recreation leaders, et. al.) seeking knowledge and skills for sharing African American history and culture with children. Through lectures, demonstrations and audiovisual media, we will give an overview of African and African American history, culture and geography. Gain knowledge and practice in reading and telling stories (history, folklore), making a personal journal, and other materials for use with children. This course will help adults foster a greater sense of self-worth and self-knowledge in children, while strengthening interpersonal relationships.

Instructor: Lillian Green, Ph.D., is a veteran teacher, retired from the School District of Philadelphia, where she taught all grade levels, and has worked in its Division of African and African American Studies Department.


CEP #308 • The Science of Political Organizing and Organizational Building • (12 Weeks)

This course is designed to familiarize the students with fundamental principles, strategies and tactics that will be useful for community self- empowerment and organizing. Students will learn techniques for creating, developing, enhancing and evaluating political-economic grass roots and mass organizations. It will be based on the philosophical principle that the masses of the people must see organization as an indispensable instrument and weapon in the struggle for dignity and liberation. Students will learn techniques for organizing and mobilizing relative to strikes, boycotts, demonstrations, press conferences, meetings, mass verbal and written education/public relations and how to counter sabotage. The course will also consider and teach the history of mass organization from a worldwide and Pan-African perspective. Particular emphasis will be placed on the role of Africans and women in the liberation struggle. The course will be extended to a second part for students who wish to participate in a field involvement within an organization of their choice.

Student Limit: 15

Instructor: Odinga Mukhtar holds a BA in Sociology and History, and an MA in Public Administration. He has lent more than 25 years to the Civil Rights, Black Power and Pan-African Movements.

MONDAY 7 – 9 PM

CEP #343 • Theories of Addiction • (12 Weeks)

In this workshop students will learn about alcohol and drug addiction. Topics include the disease concept of addiction, the cycle of addiction, assessment tools used to determine level of severity, available programs, and support vs. enabling, co-dependency and benefits of twelve (12) step meetings.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 15**

Instructor: Linda Montgomery is a PCACB certified counselor and a Civil Service Drug and Alcohol Specialist I and II. She brings more than 15 years of experience working in the health system.

**CEP #370 • Underground Railroad • (5 Weeks)**

This five-week course will discuss the history of the Underground Railroad in the mid-Atlantic region. Students will study American slavery, the economics of slavery, slavery laws and resistance to slavery. Students will take a look at the Black Community through churches, fraternal organizations and vigilance committees. They will also explore researching through primary documents and the Internet.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: Karen James is Pennsylvania State Coordinator for UGRR History Bureau of Archives and History Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. Each year, Ms. James presents UGRR history throughout Pennsylvania. Since 2003, Ms. James has traveled to 50 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties to work with communities, universities and historical societies, developing plans for the study of and to preserve Underground Railroad history. She attended the University of Albuquerque, New Mexico and Carlow College in Pittsburgh, PA. Currently Ms. James is working with the National Network to Freedom program and CASS the Center for Anti-Slavery Studies, in Susquehanna County, on a project of national interest. This project "The Place I Call Home," is ambitious and will change the way we look at rural anti-slavery communities.

Instructor: Sheri Jackson is the Northeast Regional Manager of the National Park Service (NPS) National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Program. Ms. Jackson works with a national committee of NPS managers to provide technical assistance related to developing sites, programs and facilities that are related to the Underground Railroad (UGRR); in educating the public about the historical significance of the UGRR; and in identifying and working to preserve associated sites and resources. Currently in the program are 260 members (facilities, sites and programs), 117 of which are in the Northeast Region.

**CEP #371 • Understanding the Demand of African-Americans for Reparations • (8 Weeks)**

This course engages participants in the history, legacy, and vestiges of the de facto and de jure institutions of enslavement in American. It surveys the character of crimes committed, and the perpetrators of the crimes. It discusses the pros and cons of collective responsibility and compensation, and how to establish a credible, convincing connection between past racial injustices and present day inequalities. It features an examination of the premier organization leading the demand for reparations/restitution to African-Americans. The course is designed to help close the division of understanding and mis-understanding about reparations in the African American community and the public domain.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: Ari S. Merretazon is the Chief Executive Manager, Azon Computer & Electronic Recycling. He is an ordained Minister of the Gospel and the Founder and Teacher of the Concentric Order of MAAT, A graduate of Southern New Hampshire University and a member of the National Coalition of Blacks for Reparations in America (N'COBRA)

GED / Basic Adult Literacy English • #02

Learn basic writing skills and / or prepare for the General Educational Development (GED) examination. Course covers grammar, punctuation, parts of speech and essay writing. Course may also be useful to anyone wishing to improve or "brush-up" on English writing skills.

Instructor: Staff**CEP #363 • A History of Africans in America • (12 Weeks)**

Students will learn of the untold history of Black Americans who built this country with their hopes and dreams in chains. They will review the Bible stories that gave them the hope that the God of the Bible, the God of Moses, would free them someday. Students will explore the story of the men and women who were left out of the history books, their aspirations and struggles, and the Supreme Court decisions that changed their lives.

Instructor: Harvey Quarles is an ordained Baptist minister. Reverend Quarles has been in the ministry more than 32 years. He has diverse experience as a Bible teacher, Black History, science and creation teacher. He is a certified counselor and retired after 23 years as a Philadelphia police officer. He has also traveled the world as a Merchant Marine. He has been teaching African American history for forty years. Quarles marched with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in August 1963, when King delivered his "I have a Dream" speech in Washington, DC.

CEP #62-B • American Sign Language • (12 Weeks)

This is a 12-week workshop that is designed for students of all ages who have limited or no previous knowledge of American Sign Language (ASL).

Instructor: **Baron Roane** attended the Philadelphia School for the Deaf and was an outstanding student in the Pan-African Studies Community Education Program American Sign Language course.

CEP #353• Astrology: Ancient Mysteries Science of Sciences • (12 Weeks)

This essential and informative course gives strong focus to astrology's historical, philosophical, and scientific content. This course will significantly explain the importance of this ancient science being acknowledged in African history and cultural recognition, since the ancient African people contributed this eminent science to the world.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: **Bob Eure** is a national and international Certified Professional Astrologer. He has been involved in Astrology for over 35 years. A longstanding member of the American Federation of Astrologers, Bob has studied in both American and European professional astrology schools. He was an international consultant in various areas of astrology for the Jeff Mayo School of Astrology (London, England). He has a Master's Degree in Education Counseling Psychology from Antioch College and Temple University, where he was able to do his Masters Thesis on Astrology as a method in Psychotherapy.

CEP #327 • Basic Hebrew • (12 Weeks)

This is an introductory course to the Hebrew language, including grammar, conversation, writing and discussions on the cultural and historical links in which the language has been spoken.

Instructor: **Moses Stanley Clark** has served as a Rabbi at Raweh Israel where he officiated at services and taught Hebrew and History. He has been a student of etymology and biblical studies for the past 50 years.

CEP #361 • Before You Marry • (12 Weeks)

This course has been developed for students who desire to marry, and for those who would like to strengthen their marriage. Its focus will be on the marriage covenant as ordained by God, the symbolism of the marriage ceremony, and the pits-falls of most relationships and marriages, which can be avoided. This course will be based on a Christian biblical context.

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: **Deborah A. Murgerson, Th.D.** is President and Founder of the Sanctuary of Praise & Deliverance Ministries, author of the editorial, "Sister to Sister," which has been published in both religious newspapers and magazines since 1997. Reverend Murgerson is a member of the Urban Family Council of Philadelphia, a graduate of the International Christian University, Manor Bible Institute, Jameson School of Theology, and Deliverance Evangelistic Bible Institute, where she is an Associate Minister, and member since 1980. Murgerson is also a former student of Temple University.

CEP #75-A /-B • Conversational Spanish • (12 Weeks)

This course is for students who wish to acquire or enhance their ability to verbally communicate in Spanish. Grammar and writing will be included; however, emphasis will be on the spoken language. Exploration of Spanish-speaking cultures impacted by African descendants will enrich this experience.

Instructor: **Yahya Abdul-Karim**, a veteran PASCEP faculty member, studied Spanish at Howard University and the University of Mexico, has traveled extensively and is an author, researcher and entrepreneur.

Instructor: **Janice Smith** graduated from Penn State and received her masters in Human Services at Lincoln University. She is known to many as a liaison to non-English speaking communities. She has been with the PASCEP family for over 5 years and has, and will continue, to inspire many with her knowledge

CEP #280-B • Crochet: Basic & Beyond • (12 Weeks)

Crochet is a craft that is centuries old and is experiencing a renaissance in the new millennium. We are not talking about doilies and table runners. Attend this class and learn to make your own loc crowns, kufis, ponchos, hats and bags. Crochet is a very versatile craft that can be utilized to create any garment and many household items. Come and experience crochet basics and beyond.

Note: Students can purchase hooks and yarn kits for \$20.00 from the instructor or bring their own.

Instructor: **Cora Williams** is a master crochet artist who has over thirty years of experience in the art. Ms. Williams also specializes in crocheted jewelry and dolls.



CEP #326 • Desktop Publishing: Using Microsoft Publisher to Create Great Looking Publications • (6 Weeks) (7:00-8:45PM)

If you want to learn how to make your own flyers, brochures, greeting cards, newsletters or other publications, then this course is for you. This course will teach how and to create special effects that can attract a reader's attention.

Prerequisite: Knowledge of how to use a computer and knowledge of Microsoft Word or other Office programs.

Instructor: **Edwin Massaley** holds a Master's degree in Business Administration from New York Institute of Technology in operations management. For more than ten years he has worked in computer operations.

Yoga originated from the ancient system of Egyptian culture. Hidden in symbols, yoga was taught only to those who possessed high moral values. Yoga was a way to preserve, purify and strengthen the body, considered the temple in which the soul resides. In Egypt, yoga was practiced to preserve the body from old age and disease and as a form of stress release. Vegetarian diet was also a very important contribution to health issues. Egyptian yogis were vegetarians and knew this type of diet was less taxing on the digestive system and that it increased energy. Join in a relaxing atmosphere of music and aromatherapy. Learn the breathing and stretching of Ancient Egypt as Hatha Yoga and Kemetic Yoga are incorporated, adding instruction on diet, fasting and nutrition.

Instructor: Kyle Morris is an author and a publisher, literary sponsor and winner of The Washington Post National Poetry Competition.

CEP #366 • From Victim to Victor• (12 Weeks)

This course is designed for African-Americans who have experienced childhood trauma or those who desire to help someone deal with trauma. The course is especially geared to African-American adult male and female sexual abuse survivors. Healing is a day-to-day process. The course will describe holistic ways to begin to heal the trauma. This course respects the anonymity of its participants. No children allowed.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Sylvia Coleman, BA, is an award-winning health journalist who is in the process of launching the first national non-profit for Black male and female sexual abuse survivors. Coleman is also finishing a book that features exercises for healing from sexual abuse, and includes the stories of Black sexual abuse survivors.

CEP #362 • Hone Your Skills In Effective Communication and Organizational Techniques• (12 Weeks)

This course is designed to develop your leadership skills and introduce you to organizational techniques that will put you in the forefront of your chosen field. Studies include sessions in impromptu and extemporaneous self-expression, thus preparing students to communicate more effectively in business, in public life and at home.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 25

Instructor: Ethel Hendricks has been a member of International Training in Communication Inc. for 32 years, providing training and instruction in public speaking, organizational skills, self-development and the art of leadership. She has 15 years of professional sales and management training, mentoring and motivating youth and adults in shaping their attitudes in decision-making.

CEP #224 • Practical Writing for the Real World • (8 Weeks)

All of us need to communicate through the written word. However, the act of getting something written down on paper is often no easy task. This course is meant to help participants develop techniques needed to get the job done. Special attention will be paid to help students produce winning business letters, memos, brochures, press releases, reports, resumes, and biographical summaries. We will also spend considerable time on basic rules of usage, grammar, spelling, punctuation, organization, and syntax. Homework assignments and additional reading will also be required. The goal of this course is to reduce anxiety about writing, thus creating a mental environment conducive to writing with skill and confidence.

Requirements: Sincere desire to improve written communication skills.

Fee: \$20 *Act-48 Credits Add \$25 to Fee* **Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: Pheralyn Dove is a professional journalist and poet. She used her basic skills over and over to produce articles, poems, short stories, proposals, letters, position statements, and a variety of written data, and she has led workshops, with great success, for adults and children.

CEP #338-A • Story Quilting: Stitching and Quilt History• (12 Weeks)

This course is designed for those who understand or are in the process of understanding quilt construction. It describes the basic stitches that are used to complete a quilt as well as the history of quilting itself. This course will cover quilt stitch design and shortcuts to making a “fabric sandwich” in 12 weeks.

Fee: \$20

Student Limit: 15

Instructor: Carla Wiley is a storyteller, quilt historian and instructor, literacy and preschool specialist. She has been a quilter most of her life. Starting quite young with a love of fabric, Ms. Wiley brings a teaching technique that combines the basics of the quilting bee and constructivist theory of education with adult learning principles. This combination provides a learning environment that benefits all of the different styles of the learner. Ms. Wiley has been an instructor at PASCEP since the Fall of 2003 and is a member of the PASCEP Advisory Council.

CEP #324 • The Art of Numbers • (12 Weeks)

Forget everything you have been taught about math and attend this course. The word mathematics simply means “to learn” and is a way to learn more about other things. The problem is knowing how to learn about math. Upon completion of this course, you will know how to gain proficiency in counting, reciting tables, reading equations and solving them, and everything else that you aspire to learn about math. The less you currently know about math and the more open you are to learning new things, the more prepared you are for this class.

Instructor: **Herman Muhaimin Taylor**, a four-year GED Math instructor, is self-taught in this course and has been teaching it in various literacy programs and workshops for the past eight years.

CEP #347 • Stress Elimination (Level I) • (12 Weeks)

The purpose of this course is to relieve general stress through the use of the Taoist System of the Living Arts, which is a remarkable new way to attain health-building, life-giving energy. Through the Arts of Taoism, one can achieve in the body, a state of deep relaxation, which allows one to breathe fully.

Instructor: **Abdul Kareem Muhammad** studied traditional Chinese medicine at the First World Acupuncture Association. He also attended the International Center for the Study of Medicine and Scientific Studies.

CEP #310 • Ways to Pay Yourself First • (12 Weeks)

This course is designed to share basic investing information and ways to create wealth without being rich. We will uncover the complexities of Wall Street and show you strategies that benefit you financially. It is geared for beginners and those with minimum experience. You will learn how to create wealth by understanding stocks, bonds, mutual funds, 401(k) plans, and the Wall Street Journal. You will also learn retirement planning strategies and ways to start your own investment club.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: **James R. Veal** is a financial advisor with a major investment firm in Philadelphia. His more than ten years of experience as a stockbroker and financial advisor included working on Wall Street. He currently conducts free seminars and workshops on investing and writes financial articles for a number of community newspapers.

GED / Basic Adult Literacy Reading • #03

Learn basic reading skills and / or prepare for the General Educational Development (GED) examinations. Course covers reading materials and literature (fiction, poetry, drama, non-fiction). This course is also useful for anyone wishing to improve reading skills.

Instructor: Staff**CEP #354 • Acting for Beginners • (12 Weeks 6:00-9:00PM)**

Course Description: Students will develop the beginning skills of the audition process, for all types of the performance media. The class will also teach short relaxation techniques for the purpose of good performance. Students will learn how to breathe, concentrate, and choose the right type of monologue. The course will also cover song, movement, presentation skills, artistic resumes, and biographies. Throughout the course, the instructor will focus on African American playwrights.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: **Raine Djonson** is an actress, singer, and performance artist. She is well traveled and has performed in many types of showcases, dramas, and comedies. She has studied under the direction of the late John E. Allen, Jr., Founder of the New Freedom Theatre. She has also participated in the Frank Silvera Workshop in New York City, and studied under several of Philadelphia's finest vocal coaches.

CEP #339 • Appliances 101: Washers and Dryers • (6 Weeks)

This seminar will start with a brief history of washers and dryers and their problems and solutions. This course will give students basic knowledge and the skills to identify problems and solutions. The students questions about their washers and dryers issues will be answered in class.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 15**

Instructor: **Erwin Lewis** is a graduate of the Philadelphia Wireless Technical Institute. He has a certification in major appliance repair from Delaware County Community College. He has more than five years of experience working on residential problems with washers and dryers.

CEP #373 • Basic Nutrition • (6 Weeks)

This course is will critically explore the significant components of a nutritional regimen that will increase one's quality of health and life. An emphasis will be placed on plant-based nutritional consumption, which includes a reduction in animal products, dairy, sugar, processed and chemicalized items. The focus is not designed to convert participants to vegetarianism.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: **Kevin S. McPherson-El** is a certified Holistic Health counselor able to assist in demystifying the concepts of healthy eating. Though a non-meat eater for the better part of twenty years the focus of his intention is to improve the quality of one's health.

CEP #364 • Basic Professional Modeling • (12 Weeks)

This course is open to male and female youth. Students will learn the laws of self-esteem in relation to peer conflicts and ideal problem solving. Students will practice dialogue, assertiveness, interaction and communication skills based on social etiquette. Students will learn basic walking, posture, poise and charisma. Students will learn about skin and hair care and will be consulted on beauty and imaging. Students will also participate in performing arts production activities during the semester and at the end of the course.

Fee: \$20**Student Limit: 25**

Instructor: **Bonnie Harmon** is a professional freelance local fashion model. She is a beauty and image consultant and a children and teen show producer. She is the president and CEO of Dot n Ray, Inc., a nonprofit organization for the performing arts. She graduated from Stephanie's School of Modeling and Dance in Philadelphia and is certified through George Ann's Finishing and Modeling School in Oakland, NJ.

CEP #297 • Boxing for Conditioning & Self-Defense •
 (12 Weeks)

This is a course in boxing techniques and boxing conditioning exercises. This course is open to men/ women and children/young adults 9-17 years old. The class will periodically visit local gymnasiums.

Fee: \$50 (incl. supplies) NO WAIVERS Student Limit: 15
Instructor: Yahya Abdul Karim is a professional trainer. He has trained and worked with professional boxers worldwide. He has more than 30 years experience in the "manly" art of self-defense.

CEP #317 • Experience Tai Chi and Chi Kung • (12 Weeks)

This is an introductory course to Tai Chi and Chi Kung. Participants will be exposed to the ancient Asian martial arts practice consisting of powerful moving meditation, breathing and energy development (Chi Kung). Students of these techniques experience increased mental tranquility, physical fitness, flexibility, blood circulation, relaxation, confidence and clarity.

Instructor: David Pitts has been a Tai Chi practitioner since 1981 and is presently a student of Tui Na and Taoist meditation.

CEP #351 • Grant Proposal Writing • (10 Weeks)

The *Grant Proposal Writing* course is designed to meet the development, planning and fund raising capacity-building needs of new, established, urban and rural community development corporations, housing organizations, neighborhood planning councils, faith-based nonprofit organizations and other neighborhood nonprofits that seek to develop fund requests to foundations, corporations and other grant makers.

CEP #156-A • Hair Storee: African Hairstyling Workshop •
 (8 Weeks)

Through lecture, discussion, visuals, hands-on experience, and self-reflection, students will be provided with information about natural hair care, history, braiding styles, and elementary braiding techniques.

Instructor: Exavia Love is the sole proprietor of Exavia' Natural Hair & Skin Care Salon. For more than 15 years, Ms. Love has used her expertise to help people care for their skin and hair. Her work is featured in "Naturally You" Magazine.

CEP #290-B Poetry Pulls Pain! • (6 Weeks)

Healing your hurt through poetry. Poetry is an art form based on the use of language to create imagery. It elicits a wide range of emotions for both the writer and the reader. That means that poetry has the power to "**pull pain**." Lessons are designed to assists participants in the creative writing process of their own poetry. Workshops will teach participants structure, style and how to use poetic devices to effectively describe their feelings. They will also promote self-discovery and artistic emancipation by channeling emotions through the power of the pen. Pain is an emotion just like love. Sometimes the emotion of pain causes us to forget the emotion of love. You have to get the pain out in order to let the love in. One way of doing that is to "Write It Out." Writing about living can help you go back and find the lessons that you need in order to move forward. Words, especially your own words, have power - the power to heal hurt.

Instructor: Pat McLean-RaShine is the Founder of In The Company of Poets (ITCOP) poetry performance group. 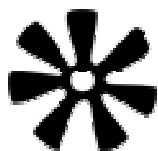

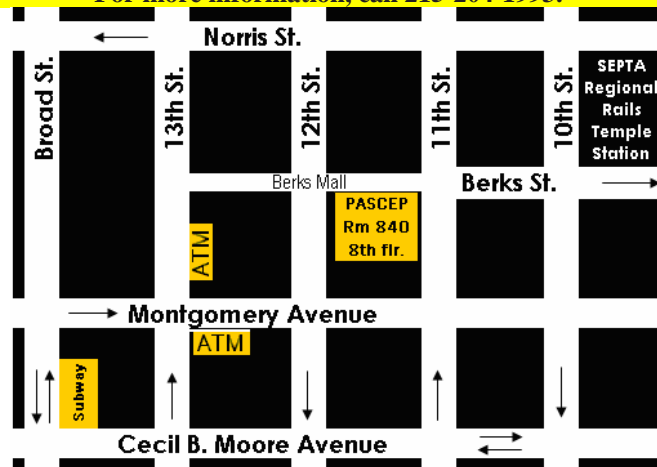

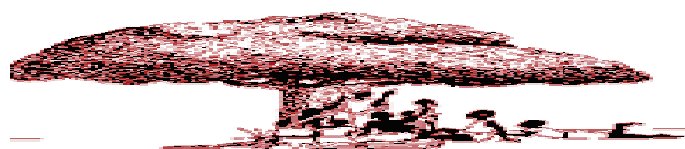
